Texas Must Increase Reimbursement Rates by 10% to Restore Access to Pediatric Therapies

Current demand for therapy services drastically outpaces Texas' workforce availability. Low reimbursement rates result in occupational, physical, and speech therapists leaving the profession. Thousands of Texas kids in need of medically necessary services are waitlisted.

How Has Access to Care Been Affected?

6,532 children on waitlists: Up from 4,961 in December 2023

Therapy Needs Have Sharply Risen

Nearly 1 in 10 U.S. children have been diagnosed with a developmental disability according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

Reimbursement Rates for Therapy Have Drastically Decreased

Rates have fallen by 34%-65% since 2014. Despite attempts to increase rates, they remain 20%-40% lower.

Statewide Staffing Shortages Have Worsened

Children with complex medical conditions require therapists with specialized skills. Highly specialized therapists are not widely available.

Leading providers report that they are not able to hire enough staff to meet clinical needs.

The Solution:

Texas leaders must increase the Statewide Therapy Fee Schedule by 10%.

Wins if Implemented:

Investing in pediatric therapy helps children become less reliant on state services, thrive in school, and grow into successful, tax-paying adults who contribute to the prosperity of Texas!
